- 3. **Dependable.** A good prayer advocate can be relied on to help keep the senior pastor accountable. If the pastor agrees to do something in regard to prayer, the prayer leader will find ways to give necessary encouragement until it is done.
- 4. **Persistent.** A good prayer advocate must have the fortitude to stay the course. Prayer isn't easly promoted; the prayer advocate will need diligence not to give up.
- 5. **Passionate.** The prayer leader doesn't need to be a gifted intercessor, but he or she does need to have a passion for prayer. While administrative skills are vital and required, this person wont succeed without the desire.
- 6. **Self-starter.** Pastors can't come up with all the ideas and do everything themselves. A good prayer advocate offers suggestions and gets things done while ensuring the pastor knows about specifics ahead of time.
- 7. **Wise.** A good prayer leader should be able to screen what information the pastors need to know so they aren't needlessly distracted.
- 8. **Prayer-focused.** Many times senior pastors don't need to be told how to fix a problem in the church they just need someone to pray about it. A good prayer advocate is able to listen and pray about a problem without trying to solve it.
- 9. **Knowledgeable.** A prayer advocate knows of and keeps the senior pastor informed about local and national prayer opportunities and events.

10. **Encouraging.** Senior pastors need support in their prayer lives. Prayer leaders will be in tune with their senior pastors in order to encourage them to take a personal prayer retreat.
